Adrienne Scott

Adrienne has a background in environmental law, sustainable development and corporate social responsibility. She has been working as a senior auditor/analyst with the federal Commissioner of the Environment and Sustainable Development – a part of the Office of the Auditor General of Canada – for over a decade. Prior to that, she was Legal Counsel with the Ontario Ministry of the Environment and Energy in Toronto. Recently Adrienne took a leave from work to pursue her MA in law which focused on international human rights law. During her studies her major area of interest was business and human rights. Her major research paper took her in a somewhat different direction, focusing on the human rights dimensions of energy poverty and the situation of rural customers of Hydro One.

Theresa is the co-author of the Thompson-Reuters 3 volume annotated Ontario Water Law, and frequent contributor to other environmental law publications including the Law Society of Upper Canada Special Lectures 2017.
