Candice Trickey

Candice Trickey serves as the Director of Marketing and Conservation Alliances at the Independent Electricity System Operator (IESO). Candice is responsible for Save on Energy marketing and outreach efforts at the IESO, working to promote energy efficiency programs and practices in homes and businesses throughout Ontario. Candice has held a number of leadership positions within the IESO, including Senior Manager of Operational Effectiveness where she was responsible for improving control centre operations and emergency preparations as well as Manager of Customer and Stakeholder Relations, where she oversaw the IESO's response to customers during the 2003 blackout and supported the evolution of demand response in the province.

Carolyn Knight

Caroline Knight is an energy conservation program advisor at Enbridge Gas Inc., a leading North American natural gas utility serving over 3.7 million customers in Ontario. In her role, Caroline is responsible for the legacy Union Gas Home Weatherization and Indigenous Home Weatherization Programs. These programs operate under the legacy Union Gas incentive framework. Caroline studied Liberal Arts at the University of Toronto (U of T) and holds a Bachelor of Arts degree and a Bachelor of Education degree from U of T, as well as a post-graduate certificate in Communications from Centennial College. Caroline is pursuing a Masters of Business Administration (MBA Leadership) through part-time distance education studies at Dalhousie University. Caroline joined the company's Public Affairs department in 2013 and focused on internal and executive communications. In 2016, Caroline moved to the Low Income Energy Conservation team and spearheaded the development and launch of the Indigenous Home Weatherization Program. With the recent merger of the two gas utilities in 2019, Caroline assumed the additional responsibility for delivering the legacy Union Gas Home Weatherization Program.

Mark Winfield

Mark Winfield is a Professor of Environmental Studies at York University. He is also Co-Chair of the Faculty's Sustainable Energy Initiative, and Coordinator of the Joint Master of Environmental Studies/Juris Doctor program offered in conjunction with Osgoode Hall Law School. Prior to joining York University Professor Winfield was Program Director with the Pembina Institute and prior to that Director of Research with the Canadian Institute for Environmental Law and Policy. He has published articles, book chapters and reports on a wide range of environmental and energy law and policy topics, with a strong focus on Ontario.

Mary Todorow

Mary Todorow is a research/policy analyst with the Advocacy Centre for Tenants Ontario (ACTO), a community legal clinic funded by Legal Aid Ontario. ACTO has a province-wide mandate to advance human rights and social justice in housing for low-income Ontarians through legal advice and representation, law reform, community organizing, and education and training. ACTO is one of the founding members of the Low-Income Energy Network (LIEN) and is represented on LIEN's steering committee. Prior to joining ACTO, Mary was a policy officer with the Municipal Electric Association (now the Electricity Distributors Association). She has also been an advocate in the non-profit co-operative housing sector, and worked at Queen's Park for over 20 years in a variety of positions both in opposition and for government.

Theresa McClenaghan

Appointed as Executive Director of CELA in November 2007, Theresa McClenaghan holds an LL.B. from Western and an LL.M. in constitutional law from Osgoode as well as a diploma in Environmental Health from McMaster. She was called to the Bars of Manitoba and Ontario. Focusing on environmental health and environmental safety, particularly in the areas of energy and water, Theresa has practised public interest environmental law for over twenty-five years both in private practice and then at CELA. In 2006-07, Theresa was senior water policy advisor to the Ontario Minister of the Environment where she was responsible for overseeing the passage of the Clean Water Act, and implementation of the remaining Walkerton Inquiry recommendations. She has represented clients at the Supreme Court of Canada, Federal Court of Appeal and Trial Division and the Ontario Court of Appeal on a range of matters including pesticide by-laws and the Oncomouse patent. Theresa was co-counsel representing the Concerned Walkerton Citizens in both phases of the Walkerton Inquiry, and has appeared at a variety of environmental, land use and energy tribunals on behalf of her clients. Theresa is co-author of the recently published three volume annotated Ontario Water Law. Theresa has appeared before the Canadian Nuclear Safety Commission and Federal Court on a number of nuclear power environmental assessment and licensing matters. Theresa has been a member of the Low-Income Energy Network steering and legal committees since its inception.
